Pastoral Call Survey: What do you expect the next pastor to do?

During the month of March 2023, both congregations took a survey to help congregational leadership better understand your views on needs we have for a pastor and the future.

Last month, I talked about **PART TIME vs. FULL TIME** pastoral leadership. This month, I will reflect on **WHAT ARE OUR EXPECTATIONS?**

The survey asked what the **TOP 3 and TOP 5 pastoral skill sets** are needed. Here are the results for each congregation, with each skill set ranked highest to lowest:


In general, survey participants in both congregations have high expectations for the pastor in **Worship, Pastoral Care, Teaching, and Outreach**.

St. Luke's emphasizes Teaching.

St. John's emphasizes Outreach.

But that is not all! What can the next pastor expect from YOU?

A majority of survey participants in both congregations view the pastor as a **co-worker** in mission. The pastor and congregation do not work together in a vacuum. If the pastor is expected to focus in certain areas, the members MUST figure out how to take up the slack in the other areas. Here are the top 4 areas of service, ranked in order highest to lowest, that survey participants said the next pastor can expect from them:

In general, the next pastor can expect members of **both congregations to offer prayer**, attend worship at least 2 Sundays per month, deepen their love for God and others, and donate money or volunteer.

Low priority for both congregations: attending Bible study, building new relationships, and visiting the sick and imprisoned.

Church Council Meeting Minutes Sunday, July 16, 2023

Opening

JoLynn called the regular meeting of the St Luke's Lutheran Church Council to order on Sunday, July 16, 2023, at 11:32am.

Attendance

Present – JoLynn Stewart, Suzanne Bucher, Janet Goldner, Bryant Matthes, Pastor Rob **Absent** – Emily Meyerson, Clay McCartney, Tracey Pritts

Bryant proposed that we suspend the agenda until August, and we will discuss the July items at our August meeting. Everyone was in favor of this.

Items Addressed

Janet suggested celebrating St Luke's 126th anniversary around our church bells ringing on the evening during Bible School – since the actual date falls during Bible School, and then celebrating after church with cake on Sunday, July 30th.

Emily Meyerson turned in her resignation on July 16, 2023. JoLynn will continue on as interim President and discussions on her replacement will begin at our August council meeting.

Call Process - Pastor Rob advised that in any congregation that has had a long-term pastor, it's always advised to take our time. Also, figuring out what to do after Covid lockdown, etc. Pastor's approach was to not form a transition team – hands off approach. Let the congregations breath for a while. Instead, a mutual ministry team was formed. Also, to conduct surveys. Pastor Rob relied on the MM team to talk us through transition and he admits he did not commit to the regular call process. Now comfortable establishing a call committee rather than to form a transition team – representation from both St Luke's and St John's.

Bryant updated us on our parking lot paving. Quote from Morlock Asphalt to redo the entire lot was \$39,900.00. Of course, we won't be doing this, so Bryant will be looking at what other options might include and will be getting some advise from a local engineer that he knows who will come over and inspect our parking lot.

Janet advised that both Lois Heilman and Carl Lieser approached her to assist her with the offering counting, so Janet has been training them both and things are going well.

Seeds Monthly

Who is a "real" American?



In her monthly column for *Living Lutheran*, ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton addresses the scourge of Christian nationalism in the U.S., calling it "a perversion of the gospel and a threat to our democracy." She writes, "An element in our country wants to legislate that the United States is a Christian nation where Christianity should be privileged and only Christians should hold office. This is Christian Nationalism, which is neither Christian nor patriotic." The ELCA supports <u>Christians Against Christian Nationalism</u> and

encourages you to participate in our civic life so that we might work together for the common good.

My husband and I live in Skokie, Ill., a diverse community. Our neighbors to the west are an octogenarian Taiwanese Evangelical couple who regularly order meals from Kosher to Go. Our neighbors to the east are a Ukrainian and Russian multigenerational family. Our grocery stores have both kosher and halal departments. As I drive past the elementary school on my way to work, I see moms and dads in jeans along with women in saris or hijabs and men in thobes or yarmulkes. More than 90 languages are spoken in the homes of our school district. We pay our taxes, mow our (tiny) lawns, worship, raise our children and pretty much get along in our little village of Skokie.

Late one afternoon a few years ago I was finishing up yard work. I had been weeding and trimming all day. I was tired and grass-stained. Just one more pile of leaves needed to be swept up. I noticed a woman walking toward me so I hurried to get the sidewalk cleared. She stopped and told me that she had seen me working all day and thought I might be too tired to prepare supper. She had made a meal for me and my husband. It was during Ramadan—the month when Muslims fast from food and water during the day and engage in prayer and acts of charity. This was her act of charity and generosity. She smiled and walked away. I was stunned.

There has been an alarming rise in hate speech and violence against religious and ethnic minorities in this country. At the same time, we've seen an increased polarization among us, even in our dear church. There is a movement to define what it means to be a "real American." Some would define this as white, Christian and native born. When Lutheran immigrants first came to this country in the 18th and 19th centuries, they weren't considered real Americans. They didn't speak English or fit in with the Deist, Calvinist religious majority. They were "other" and therefore suspect. German Lutheran immigrants weren't considered white when they settled here. Neither were Irish, Italians or Poles. Catholics and Jews were considered an alien threat.




